## Rector's Letter

Dear friends

As we approach Easter, we are reminded of the events that are at the centre of our faith, namely the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, events that changed the world for good (in both senses of that phrase!), and I am also



reminded that in order to help the disciples make sense of what was going to happen, Jesus turned to a format, so to speak, that he seemed to favour – namely a shared meal. In this instance, it was not just any meal but a recasting of the Passover meal that their Israelite forbears had first tasted the night before they were rescued from slavery in Egypt. And in recasting this meal Jesus was saying that through his broken body and shed blood he would be rescuing all humanity from its slavery to sin and death and so bring us to freedom, not in a physical Promised Land, but in the glorious freedom that comes from being sons and daughters of God, adopted into his family. All of which is of course why the shared meal of Communion is the central act of worship of the Church. It is, apart from anything else, a celebration of our freedom! So hopefully it will not be long before we are free to share Communion again as the restrictions imposed upon us are eased by the government.

But of course it won't only be freedom to come together in worship again that the easing of restrictions will bring, for we will be free, for example, to go to the pub, go on holiday, meet new people, reconnect with old friends, decide on the spur of the moment to go to the beach, eat out in restaurants, eat in with friends and so on.

But as we do so, perhaps we might learn from Jesus who seemed to spend a surprising amount of his time eating with others. In addition to eating with his disciples at the last supper, we know that he ate outdoors with crowds,



that he ate with pharisees, he ate with tax collectors and other social outcasts, he ate at wedding feasts, he invited himself to eat at Zacchaeus' home, and he ate at the home of Martha and Mary. In other

words, he felt free to eat with all and sundry – and I mention this because as we come out of lockdown and meet up with friends and family and eat with them, we will risk being quite narrow in who we connect with, socialise with.

Why don't we instead follow the example of Jesus who was, it seems, deliberately indiscriminate with whom he ate. Thus we should eat with those who we already know, with those we don't know well but would like to, those who we have got to know over the lockdown such as our neighbours or zoom coffee contacts, or even those who we wouldn't have given a second thought to spending time with before the pandemic.

And I say this because as Jesus clearly knew, eating together is good for us – it's a way of blessing and a way of being blessed, of celebrating our humanness, of valuing people as we give each other our time and attention. And who knows, if we offer our eating with others to God, we might have conversations that help people take their next step on their journey of faith – after all, look what happened when Jesus came to eat at the house of Zacchaeus.

And as an aside, I would say that I hope that one of the key elements of our newly reformed small groups will be eating together – and if you would like to be part of one of these groups, then do let me know – they will be places

of growing in faith, in relationships and in service.



Having said all this, I do want to say that as and when we come out of the restrictions that have so impacted us, we should not expect everything to be straightforward and easy – yes, there will be a lot of joy and celebration, but there will also

be a lot of adjusting to do, a lot of grieving to be done, a lot of pent-up strain and stress to be released – so let's be slow to judge and quick to show compassion and love – and maybe eating together will be one way of doing so.

## QUESTION CORNER

Q. *Should church leaders meddle in politics?*

*They should prepare people for heaven.*

A. I once attended an event when a group were discussing the state of society. When I added a comment, one man said “What’s it got to do with you, Vicar? You’re just concerned about the after-life” (he was not a church member). I told him he couldn’t have been more wrong!



Jesus was criticized for mixing religion and ‘politics’. He would not separate

love of God from love of neighbour. Love of neighbour now includes being concerned about people’s health, education, housing conditions etc, and wants justice for all. So sometimes Christians should protest, as when bishops challenged the government’s

welfare reforms as being unfair to those in real need. In the Lord’s Prayer we say “Your Kingdom come ON EARTH as in heaven”. This means, amongst other things, that WE should be peacemakers (Matthew 5,9). Also, we pray that more might acknowledge God as king of all areas of their lives – and that we should too. (‘Kingdom come’ is something that Simon has stressed in his ministry here.)

It’s not always apparent, but at best politics should be concerned for people’s well-being. So should religion, so there’s a link. But the church is not tied to any one party, and the pulpit is not a party political platform.

As for heaven, Easter proclaims that Jesus invites us to share in his risen life, but not just in heaven. In Colossians 3, St Paul writes to the Christians as those ALREADY risen with Christ, because our new relationship with him starts here on earth. It helps us through difficult times and points forward to glory to come, so we believe in life before death, not just an ‘after-life’. It’s not all about ‘pie in the sky when you die’!

## PLASTIC FREE GARDENING



Spring is springing and the gardening season is starting in earnest now. It is worth, however, bearing in mind how much plastic is used when gardening and trying to reduce our usage.

According to the RHS, there are currently around 500 million plastic pots in circulation. Plastic plant pots take more than 400 years to break down and around a third of the 78 million tons of plastic packaging produced annually ends up in the ocean. Black plastic plant pots cannot be recycled with your usual household recycling as the black colour prevents the sorting machines detecting them in the recycling process. There are some new polypropylene taupe and grey pots on the market which are recyclable, but they are not widely available yet.

So what can you do? First of all, reduce the quantity of plastic plant pots you have by trying to avoid buying them in the first place (easier said than done if you are a plant-a-holic like me!). Go for plants sold in recyclable taupe pots, or terracotta or coir pots instead, although you then have the downside of terracotta being heavy and coir having a high carbon footprint in its manufacture and importation. Alternatively, grow plants from seed if you can – it is much cheaper and more satisfying to grow something yourself from seed than merely buying the fruits of someone else's labour.

Secondly, reuse your plastic plant pots as much as possible. After you have finished with them, clean the pots thoroughly to get rid of any old soil or pathogens then store them until you need them again. Looked after carefully, they can last for many years before they need to be replaced. B&Q Harrogate recycle plant pots: take them, clean and bagged up, to their main returns desk and they send them for recycling. RHS Harlow Carr have skips by their goods-in area further down Crag Lane where you can pick up some of their unwanted pots to use yourself.

Alternatively, some plants will grow very well in other containers. Sweet peas, or peas, for instance, do very well sown into toilet roll innertubes – the toilet roll biodegrades in the soil when planted, and doesn't disturb the roots of the young plants. You can also make your own plant pots with waste cardboard or newspaper, which are just as effective and also biodegrade.



Plastic plant labels are easy to write on but break easily. You can use lollipop sticks and it gives you an excuse to eat ice cream!), or copper or aluminium labels instead. Swap plastic string and netting for natural fibres instead – it is kinder to the plants and birds will not get entangled in it.

- At least two new 'Small Groups' will be starting after Easter, joining established groups in sharing Bible study, worship, prayer, mutual support and encouragement, and outreach
- Resurrected Bites is providing food and essentials for struggling families
- And many individual church members are visiting, ringing, shopping for, and praying for other members of the church and of Bilton community.
